2014 Marathon,

The 2014 Marathon will be run over 7 days with a lay day midway through. We have penciled in the 16th to the 22nd of March 2014 so pop these in your diary now. The tour will start on Sunday morning and finish on Saturday night allowing for our distant friends to travel on the weekends.

We intend spending at least two nights in Cromwell so we can have a look around the new race track and give you the chance to spend some money enjoying what it has to offer. We will provide full details of this in an upcoming newsletter.

We are going south again and this year will be plotting on both gravel and seal. For the 2012 tour we plotted entirely on seal after feedback from some members (who did not do the tour as it turns out) and provided map only gravel alternatives. Interestingly everyone used the gravel alternatives so we will include them in the main route and provide map only sealed alternatives just in case.

The tour will be focused mainly on the South Canterbury, North and South Otago regions with the first night in Waimate, the second in Twizel and at least two nights in Cromwell. Other overnight stops will be determined when plotting and subject to accommodation availability.

Graeme and Graeme will be off the plot the route sometime soon and want to offer someone the chance to help with this. They have plotted the last 9 long distance events and feel it is time to inject some new blood.
